<u>Course Topics or Outline</u>: The following topics concerning effective methods of teaching modern foreign languages, especially Spanish, will be discussed:

- 1) On Knowing a Language: Communicative Competence, Proficiency, and the Standards for Foreign Language Learning (based on Chapter 1 of the required text)
- 2) On Teaching a Language: *Principles and Priorities in Methodology* (based on Chapter 3 of the required text)
- 3) The Role of Context in Comprehension and Learning (based on Chapter 4 of the required text)
- 4) Teaching for Cultural Understanding (based on Chapter 8 of the required text)
- 5) Classroom Testing (based on Chapter 9 of the required text)
- 6) Lesson Planning: Planning Instruction for the Proficiency-Oriented Classroom: Some Practical Guidelines (based on the Epilogue of the required text)

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Course Objectives: The objectives of this course are to provide students with current theories of methods of teaching modern foreign languages, especially in Spanish, and offer the students an opportunity to discuss various methods of teaching modern foreign languages as well as applying these methods in classroom situations through lesson planning and presentation of these lesson plans to other students in the class.

<u>Course Requirements</u>: The requirements for this course are the following:

- 1) Students must read the assigned chapters in required class and be ready to discuss the topics in the related chapters related to their own personal experiences in learning and teaching (if applicable) a foreign language.
- 2) Students must write a short paper on a method of teaching a modern foreign language of their choice. In this paper, students should discuss the strengths and weaknesses of the method under discussion and explain how they would use the method in their own Spanish class.
- 3) There will be short quizzes on the assigned readings in the required text.
- 4) At the end of this course, as a final project, students are required to plan and present a lesson plan on the topic of their choice in a modern foreign language. This lesson plan should include specific objectives related to the Standards for Foreign Language Learning, class activities revelant to the objectives for the lesson, and a homework assignment. The use of technology in the presentation of the final course lesson, such as Power Point, is encouraged.

Conceptual Framework Statement: The professional education program at Western Carolina University fulfills its mission by creating and nourishing a community of learners guided by knowledge, values, and experiences. They are also encouraged to use technology as part of their lesson plan and plan the lesson to reach diverse student learners of a modern foreign language.
