Because this was a very short unit, you can probably guess what the EKGs are. If not, here's a hint: be able to distinguish between VT and abberant SVT, and be able to identify WPW and LGL. The cheat sheet with the Brugada criteria is included in the exam. The goal is for you to be able to apply the criteria to the strips. Memorizing the Brugada criteria isn't practical.

Be able to use the Brugada criteria.

How can carotid sinus massage and heart sounds be used to differentiate VT and abberant SVT?

What are the mechanisms of preexcitation syndromes?

What is the normal delay in conduction through the AV node?

Who are the at-risk groups for WPW and LGL?

What are the EKG criteria for WPW and LGL?

What are the immediate threats to life in

WPW and LGL?

What medications should be avoided in WPW?

What are the treatments for LGL and WPW?
